The Department of Mental Retardation and Best Buddies CT have partnered together over the years to enrich Best Buddies programs throughout the state. In recent years, the Connecticut contingent for the *Volvo Best Buddies Challenge* bicycle race has grown from just a few riders to a 24-member team in 2006. Not only has the Team CT grown, but the \$40,000 raised this year ranked them fifth in overall contributions.

Additional guest speakers included a DMR Nurse and an SMRW, who both spoke about the rewards of health care careers with the DMR population. Some of the young adults even accompanied their parents on home visits and helped to facilitate an Individual Plan. Parents then joined their youngster for a viewing of the CPTV video “The Challenge” after which a discussion ensued about the lives of people with disabilities and how we can all make a difference. Each child left with a copy of the poster “Some Words Do Hurt” and the task of hanging it up in their school, but not before rounding out the day with ice cream sundaes.

Everyone seemed to have a valuable and enjoyable experience, and some of the children wrote letters expressing their impressions. Young Andre Holloway wrote “I learned that we should not call people retarded because it makes them feel bad”, while ten-year-old Matthew Greggis noted “I learned today at DMR that you should always treat people with disabilities like how you want to be treated...when kids you know laugh and imitate and call each other retarded, next time please decide what is the right thing to do”.

Ten-year-old Julia Goss summed it all up when she found out that “working at DMR isn’t easy.....you have to do a lot of stuff like deliver mail, type up minutes, organize a lot of stuff, and go to all the meetings....” The event was a success and the region plans to continue the effort to educate our young people in future years.
